One is One and All Alone: Solo Music by Bach

The Math of Music scores highly with a free public series of Bach solo recitals

BERKELEY, California – The Mathematical Sciences Research Institute (MSRI) presents Elizabeth Blumenstock, one of the country's leading baroque violinists, in the second concert in a series that features J. S. Bach's solo music. Blumenstock performs *Sonatas and Partitas for Solo Violin* on Monday, October 23 at 5:30 pm as part of the "MATHEMATICS + MUSIC" series of *free* public recitals at MSRI to promote awareness of math's often unacknowledged contribution to music and art.

ELIZABETH BLUMENSTOCK is a frequent soloist (violin and viola), concertmaster, and leader with Philharmonia Baroque Orchestra, American Bach Soloists, Chicago Opera Theater, and the Italian ensemble, Il Complesso Barocco. She is also a member of several of the finest period instrument ensembles, including Musica Pacifica, Trio Galatea, Trio Galanterie, the Arcadian Academy, and American Baroque. Ms. Blumenstock is Resident Artistic Director of the LAbased period-instrument orchestra, Musica Angelica, and is a concertmaster of the newly formed Festival Orchester Goettingen in Germany. She has over 85 recordings with Dorian, Harmonia Mundi, Virgin Classics, BMG, Reference Recordings, Koch International, Sony, and New Albion, among others. Ms. Blumenstock has appeared worldwide with period orchestras and chamber ensembles, including at the Boston and Berkeley Early Music Festivals, Santa Fe Chamber Music Festival, Los Angeles Opera, Carmel Bach Festival, and the San Luis Obispo Mozart Festival. She is instructor of baroque violin at USC and UC Berkeley.

The interplay between math and music continues to be explored in MSRI's public presentations, including the inaugural Bach recital, *The Art of Fugue*, with harpsichordist Davitt Moroney performing for a standing room only audience, and as a theme for discussion with an array of renown musicians: from avant-garde composer Philip Glass to pianist Christopher Taylor, who have appeared on stage at public events with mathematician Robert Osserman moderating conversations. The finale of the Bach concert series is scheduled for Thursday, January 18, 2007 at 5:30 pm: *Suites for Solo Cello* with Tanya Tomkins on Baroque cello.
